Peel's Context


- Rapid Growth – 20,000 people each year
- Uneven Growth:

Population growth from 2006 – 2011:

- Caledon – 4.2%
- Brampton – 20.8%
- Mississauga 6.7%


- Unique Challenges:
 - Greenfield (Brampton)
 - Intensification (Mississauga)
 - Rural (Caledon)
- More vehicle trips
- Increasing single occupant vehicle trips
- Increasing physical inactivity levels

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History – A Peel Health Status Report



- In 2005, Peel Public Health released the State of Region's Health Report which focused on unhealthy weights and associated health consequences among adults
- The report highlighted the impact of the built environment on health
- Council embraced recommendations in the report and provided Resolutions for Planning and Health to collaborate.

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
History – Council Direction

2005

- Comment on development applications
- Develop planning policies for active living
- Advocate for provincial policy

2008

- Develop policy for Regional Official Plan
- Develop policy for Municipal Secondary Plans
- Advocate for provincial policy



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Development of Peel's Healthy Development Index

Collaboration with Peel Planning led to **narrative**, mostly qualitative comments on secondary and block plans



Peel Public Health identified the need for an **evidence-based quantitative tool** for evaluating development applications

Evidence-based **elements** & quantitative **measures**

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Development of Peel Healthy Development Index (HDI)

Purpose:

To evaluate development applications in a consistent manner and provide health-based rationale to inform planning decisions.

Process:

1. Review of academic and grey literature
2. Strength of evidence analysis
3. Extensive stakeholder consultation
4. Policy gap analysis
5. Geographic Information Systems (GIS)-based validation analyses



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Peel Healthy Development Index (HDI)

Output:

Index consisting of **seven** built environment **elements**:

- Density
- Proximity to services and transit
- Land use mix
- Street connectivity
- Road network and sidewalk characteristics
- Parking
- Aesthetics and human scale



Elements are further broken down into **measures**, many of which are quantitative

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Peel Healthy Development Index (HDI) – Example

2. a. Proximity to a Variety of Services and Employment – Prerequisite:

- ❖ ≥ 75% of residential units must be within ≤ 800m of ≥ 5 neighbourhood public services*
- ❖ ≥ 75% of residential units must be within ≤ 800m of ≥ 7 neighbourhood retail services**
- ❖ The centre of primarily residential communities must be within ≤ 800m of the same number of full- and part-time jobs as 50% of the total number of residential dwelling units in the community.
- ❖ The centre of primarily non-residential communities must be within ≤ 800m of the same number of residential units as 50% of the total number of full- and part-time jobs in the community.
- ❖ *We may want to include another option of being able to access sufficient numbers of jobs using transit.*


The **elements** and **measures** were developed based upon associations documented in the literature, after strength of **evidence** analysis.



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Peel's Healthy Development Index (HDI): Implementation Issues

- One size does not fit all; the HDI is **reference document**
- Health uses **support from planners, engineers** and **management staff** for successful implementation
- Most readily applied to **greenfield** development
- HDI needs to be **coupled** with existing processes, tools, policies and resources (e.g., Provincial Policy Statement Review process, Official Plan amendment, Engineering standards)
- Leadership needs to have vision and courage.



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Successes – Peel's Healthy Development Index (HDI)

Area Municipal Council Resolutions:

Town of Caledon to reference Peel Public Health's Health Development Index (HDI) in settlement area expansion studies, transportation studies, community improvement plans, and planning of roads, trails and parks. (February 14th, 2012)

City of Mississauga to reference Peel Public Health's Health Development Index (HDI) and consult Public Health Staff in further community studies and local area plans; and to create a Health Background Study Terms of Reference for Mississauga. (May 9th, 2012)

City of Brampton to reference Peel Public Health's Health Development Index (HDI) and consult Public Health staff in future transportation studies, urban design guideline studies, community improvement plans, block plans, future community planning studies. (June 6th, 2012)

REPORT TITLE: ROAD CHARACTERIZATION STUDY (RCS) AND STRATEGIC GOODS MOVEMENT NETWORK STUDY (SGMNS) UPDATE

OBJECTIVE
To provide Regional Council with a status update for the Road Characterization Study (RCS) and Strategic Goods Movement Network Study (SGMNS).

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- The RCS will develop a map of road characters responsive to context for each Regional Road with design guidelines that include access control. The project deliverables will include a set of design guidelines with access control customized to align with each character type. The project will also include a set of design guidelines for the adjacent roads.
- The Region of Peel kicked-off the RCS on April 19, 2012 and held the first of three workshops on June 22, 2012. Two more workshops are planned, the next will be held September 13, 2012. The workshops will be followed by a design charrette, which is tentatively planned for November 14-15, 2012 and will focus on access control. Broad attendance, active participation, and a collaborative approach are critical to the success of the RCS. We encourage your continued participation.
- Originally envisioned in two phases, Phase I of the RCS will conclude in spring 2013, the project is on schedule to make this deadline and includes the deliverables stated above. Stakeholders will be invited to review the findings during the final Phase II of the RCS immediately following Phase I. Phase II will apply the guidelines and develop aesthetic features such as landscaping for each cross-section.
